- 4. Arrest
- 5/6. Legal Sample/DRE Eval (Categories)
- 7. Oral Fluid Sample
- 8. Booking
- 9. Arresting Officer's Report
- 10. DRE can now share the results of the Oral sample with arresting officer
- 11. DRE Reports Results

Legislation

- Blood/Urine collected and confirmed by BCA
- Oral fluid cannot be used for arrest decision
- Statewide multiagency project
- Checking the reliability of the instruments
- Committee members will analyze findings



- Request sample
- The subject handles the collection swab
- Once the swab turns blue, there is enough saliva collected
- Directed where to collect from
- Takes about 2 minutes

Language in Reports

- Boiler plate language to put in the police report (Standardized)
- To be included in all reports where a sample was collected
- Drafted by several attorneys

Sample Was Collected

After the decision to arrest [Subject's Name] was made, I asked them if they would participate in Minnesota's pilot project for roadside testing by providing a sample of oral fluid for testing.
 [Subject's name] consented to roadside oral fluid testing for drugs and they swabbed the inside of their mouth as instructed. The sample was analyzed by the [Drug Test 5000 / Intoximeters SoToxa] device, which [has/have] been approved for the pilot project. I did not learn the results of the test until after [Subject's Name] was arrested and the arrest process was completed. None of the information gathered by the oral fluid device was used to form probable cause to arrest or used to obtain a search warrant for a blood or urine test.

Sample Was Not Collected

After the decision to arrest [Subject's Name] was made, I asked them if they would voluntarily
participate in Minnesota's pilot project for roadside oral fluid testing. [Subject's name] declined to
provide an oral fluid sample. [Subject's Name]'s choice to not participate in the pilot project did
not factor into my decision to arrest them and was not used in the formation of probable cause to
apply for a search warrant for a blood or urine test.
