













SAFETY Messages

Helmet & Seatbelt

Under 18 shall not ride as a passenger or as an operator of an ATV on public land, waters and road right-of-way, without an **approved helmet** (DOT/Snell)

*no hockey or bicycle helmets





Under age 18 shall not ride as a passenger or as an operator of a **Class 2** ATV without wearing a **seat belt** when provided by manufacturer

ATV Definition

Class 1 ATV Effective 7-1-2015

An all-terrain vehicle that has a width from outside of tire rim to outside of tire rim is 50 inches or less



Class 2 ATV Effective 7-1-2015

An all-terrain vehicle that has a width from outside of tire rim to outside of tire rim is greater than 50 inches but not more than 65 inches









Vehicles not meeting definition

All-terrain vehicle **does NOT** include:

- golf cart
- mini-truck
- dune buggy
- go-cart

or a vehicle designed and used specifically from lawn maintenance, agriculture, logging or mining purposes (Sometimes referred to as UTV's).

Class 1 ATV Operation

84.928 Subd 1 (a)

A person **shall not** operate a Class 1 ATV

- *along or on the roadway (traveled surface)
- shoulder
- inside bank or slope of the road of a trunk, county state-aid, or county highway

*Unless allowed by county ordinance

County ATV Ordinance

MN Statute 84.928.1(k)

(k) A county, city, or town, acting through its governing body, may by ordinance allow a person to operate an all-terrain vehicle on a public road or street under its jurisdiction to access businesses and residences and to make trail connections.

Several counties in Minnesota have created ordinances which allows the operation of Class 1 ATV on county road surfaces...

May require to operate with a permit or without a permit.




CLASS 2 ATV Operation

Operation of Class 2 ATVs is limited to:

- State Forest & Minimum Maintenance Roads
- Designated Class 2 trails
- Certain public roads/streets

Under **84.928 (1)(c)** – **Class 2 may operate** on the Shoulder or extreme right side of county roads and on the right side of township roads and city streets, IF not prohibited by the road authority or other local laws, and with a valid driver's license.





Example of Class 2 ATV operation on County Road

Allowed on City street by ordinance



84.928 Subd 1 (j)

A person shall not operate an all-terrain vehicle at any time within the right-of-way of an interstate highway or freeway within this state



Driver's License

A driver's license issued by the state or another state is required to operate an all-terrain vehicle along or on a public road right-of-way....


ATV Safety Training Requirement

84.925 Subd 5 Training Requirements

(a) An individual who was born after July 1, 1987, and who is 16 years of age or older, must successfully complete the independent study course component of all-terrain vehicle safety training before operating an all-terrain vehicle on public lands or waters, public road rights-of-way, or state or grant-in-aid trails.

(Adults: No hands-on riding component required)





Violations encountered on public road right of ways...

Registration: Expired or none at all

Youth> No Helmet & No parent with

Other violations

- No Headlights (must be on at all times)
- Adults allowing operation in violation of law (under 18)
- Careless Operation
- Operate in prohibited areas (public waters or wetlands)
- DWI

Road Crossings – operator must:

- Cross 90 degrees
- Come to complete stop
- Yield to traffic
- Cross divided highway at intersections

Operation at Night

Lights on at all times (regardless of time of day)

May not operate against traffic at night

Items towed must have reflective material and rigid hitch

DWI

169A.20 DRIVING WHILE IMPAIRED

- Subd. 1b. Driving while impaired crime; snowmobile and all-terrain vehicle.
- It is a crime for any person to operate or be in physical control of a snowmobile as defined in section <u>84.81</u>, <u>subdivision 3</u>, or all-terrain vehicle as defined in section <u>84.92</u>, <u>subdivision 8</u>, anywhere in this state or on the ice of any boundary water of this state.

License Revocation under DWI law

A person's **driver's license can be withdrawn immediately** following any test failure or refusal.

The person is given a seven-day temporary license to drive before the withdrawal becomes effective.

The period of license withdrawal is based on the current offense and number of prior impaired incidents.

DWI Violator Using an Off-road Recreational Vehicle or Motorboat

Any person who commits a DWI violation involving an off-road recreational vehicle or motorboat is subject to the same administrative sanctions and criminal penalties as the person would be if arrested while driving a regular motor vehicle.

FAQ from Officers / Deputies / Troopers

- <u>Do subjects need to have ignition interlock on rec vehicles?</u> YES, anyone who is required to participate in the ignition interlock program can only operate a boat, ATV, or snowmobile if it is also equipped with an ignition interlock device.
- Are subjects revoked from driving rec vehicles if the arrest happened before August 1st, 2021? NO, the DWI laws were updated from Little Alan's Law and took effect on August 1st, 2021. ALL DWI license revocations after Aug 1st, 2021 apply to ALL vehicle classifications.
- What is the charge for driving a rec vehicle with a revoked license?
